The entire planned and assigned task has being completed within timeline. The periodical review about academic work is being taken through meetings and group conferences. As per University direction, the college have established College Development Committee (CDC) which provide advice, guidance and decision making to assist regarding academic, financial and infrastructural development. In addition to this IQAC i. e. Internal Quality Assurance Cell provide intellectual and moral supports and advise in context of quality enhancement and development. In this regarded CDC and IQAC periodically meet and conduct discussion with staff council and principal.
