Formal types of evaluation: These types of evaluation done through procedural system. To perform evaluation, the examination committee set four steps mentioned as below.

1. Weekly individual and group conference on field work (social work practicum)
2. Presentation and viva of Assignment.
3. Terminal examination and viva – voce examination
4. Feedback system.

The continuous internal evaluation contains theory and fieldwork report which isproceeding as follows.

1. Individual and group conference on social work practicum of BSW and MSW held every week as per class wise conference periods.

4. Performance in theory is being assessed through unit test and terminal examination.
5. BSW IV-semester and MSW IV semester have research project for 100 marks that is to be done through internal and external viva voce.
6. Performances of teacher are evaluated though feedback.

Informal type: Informal type of evaluation is observed through teacher's observation, interaction, question answer session and participation of students in co-curricular, extracurricular and extension activities.

UG Level Admission:

During the year college started from 15th June 2018. In this session the last date of admission was 6th Aug. 2018. Admissions have done as per university schedule that 39 Admission on 25 to 30 June, Second Round on 02 to 04 June, and on third round one admission has been done. In this way 60 admissions has completed additional 20 % has been filled in 5th round on 5th Sept. 2018.

PG Level Admission:

Online admission procedure rehearsed from 2018-19 for PG. Programme as our college is minority category, 50% (30) Sheet has been done offline. Remaining 30 admissions filled through offline process. Thus all 60 admissions have been filled before 5th Aug. 2018. The offline 30 admission has been filled through personal, group interview and merit. The enrolment of all admitted students has been submitted within 15 day of admission to the university.

Examination:

To carry out examination related activities, examination committee set up. The schedule of university winter examination has been started from 18/10/2018. The committee has completed internal viva-voce on social work practicum up to the end of Sept. 2018. The term examination of winter session has been conducted between 03/10/2018 to 09/10/2018.

As far as summer session is concerned, university summer examination schedule for PG. Started for 12/03/2019. Hence all internal viva-voce submission of assignment, journals has been submitted in Feb. 2019. PG. Summer university examination schedule started from 27/04/2019. Hence up to 10 April, all internal viva-voce on research and social work practical comp listed.

The learn examination for PG was conducted between 08/04/2019 to 12/04/2019, Thus calendar prepared and adhered.

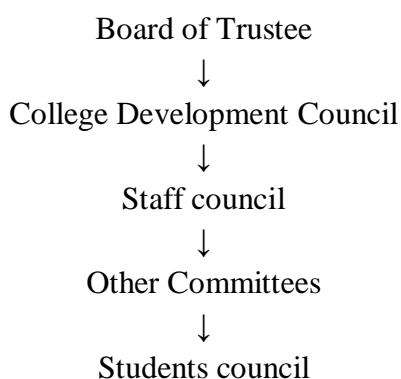
Facilities :
